Emancipated!

As we approach the spring holidays of Easter and Passover, I thought I'd write on the word that best describes how I feel as I approach my 6 month point in sobriety, and what it means to me. The other day an old using buddy asked me how I feel now that I'm not smoking weed all day, every day. He was amazed at the profound changes he's observed in me in the last five-plus months, and with a bit of envy and curiosity asked me what's changed in my life, and how sobriety feels. The first word that came to my mind was EMANCIPATION! I knew that the word had larger meaning as it obviously refers to the freeing of the slaves at the end of the Civil War, but I too feel freed from slavery and bondage; thus the answer: Emancipated!

I was a slave to pot for over 25 years, and was hopelessly imprisoned. I felt shackled!--like I had cement shoes on my feet, a ball and chain attached to my leg and a weight belt around my waist while I tried to swim. The anxiety of a dwindling bag, the terror of not knowing where to score, and the demoralization of smoking away all one's hopes and dreams is a form of slavery. Not having the freedom and the will to live one's life is a form of bondage.

As a practicing Jew I am (as of this writing) about to celebrate Passover, which is the story of Moses and his battle with the Pharaoh of Egypt over the slavery and imprisonment of the biblical Jews. When Moses realized

he was a Hebrew rather than a privileged Egyptian, he decided to confront his step brother Ramses and lead the Jews out of bondage. We've all seen the movie The Ten Commandments where Charlton Heston and Yul Brynner perfectly play the respective parts of the protagonist and the antagonist, and the analogy to the concepts of sobriety and freedom is remarkable. This famous biblical story can be linked symbolically to MA and to the addict's battle for sobriety.

The Egyptians were some seriously stubborn people just as we marijuana addicts are. When Moses told Pharaoh to free the Jews, threatening that otherwise really bad stuff would surely happen, Pharaoh said "NO WAY!" When people around us said, "Dude, you smoke WAY too much weed, you really need to cut back or stop altogether," we also said, "NO WAY!"

Then, Moses began to unleash an unprecedented series of bad happenings upon the Egyptians, beginning by turning the drinking water into blood. Yet the Pharaoh still stood pat and said, "NO WAY!" We addicts understand the Pharaoh. After all, we began to lose our friends, lose our spouses and lose our jobs, yet we still continued to abuse marijuana.

Next Moses unleashed upon the Egyptians frogs, lice, pestilence, death of all livestock, boils, hail and thunder, and locusts--yet Pharaoh continued to practice his old ways. We began to lose everything over our pot smoking. We lost money, lost friends, and

alienated family, and yet we stood pat and kept smoking our lives away. We lost our drive, we lost our motivation, and eventually hit rock bottom, and crawled into the rooms of MA beaten and demoralized. I think Pharaoh was a pot head because he was one stubborn dude! Only after Moses delivered the death blow, killing the firstborn children of every Egyptian family only then did Pharaoh finally say, "I give up and need to go to an MA meeting." Then Moses assembled the Jews and began leading them across the desert in hopes of finding safety. But then Pharaoh again went back to his old ways, and sent his army after the Jews!

The Pharaoh had to hit rock bottom to change his ways; we potheads similarly deal with the incomprehensible demoralization of losing everything before we begin to recover, and then we often relapse just as Pharaoh did. We get sucked into using again by friends and old using buddies. We get goaded into relapse by people who need us to continue using so that they can feel good about their own problems just as Pharaoh got pressured into relapse by his wife and advisors, who argued that without the Hebrew slaves, who would build the future pyramids of Egypt? So Pharaoh did what most of us potheads do: We forget how bad it was, and start using again only to eventually suffer even more terrible consequences which in some cases leads to death.

When we finally hit rock bottom and crawl into the rooms asking for help, it's just like being freed from years of slavery and bondage. You'd think after the ten plagues, the Egyptians and the Pharaoh would have gotten the message, yet he still stood his ground and held onto his bag and bong. You'd think after we began to lose our families, our finances, our jobs and our dignity, we'd get the message that we need to stop smoking, yet we continue to hold onto our weed as if it's a life preserver and we're floating in the ocean.

Yes, we have a lot to be thankful for this time of the year just as the Jews who were freed from bondage did. We too have been freed from slavery: the bondage of marijuana addiction. So, when someone asks you what being sober feels like, you can answer with the word EMANCIPATION. Anon.

The Twelve Steps of Marijuana Anonymous

- 1. We admitted we were powerless over marijuana, that our lives had become unmanageable.
- 2. Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.
- 3. Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God, as we understood God.
- 4. Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.
- Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.
- 6. Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.
- 7. Humbly asked God to remove our shortcomings.
- 8. Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
- 9. Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
- 10. Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong, promptly admitted it.
- 11. Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God, as we understood God, praying only for knowledge of God's will for us and the power to carry that out.

 12. Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to marijuana addicts and to practice these principles in all our affairs. ▲
