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A Commitment to You by Tristan H.

I'm guilty. I'm guilty of doing what I said I would never do. I'm guilty of what I criticized others of doing. And I'm sorry. I'm sorry for being judgmental, I'm sorry for criticizing them in the first place, and I'm sorry for doing exactly what I criticized others of doing.

Hi, my name is Tristan H., I am a Marijuana Addict. I'm in my 8th year of recovery, and I haven't been to a meeting in weeks. Before

going to that meeting I hadn't been to a meeting in weeks. Before that meeting, I hadn't been to...well, you get the idea, right?

I've always been really critical of people in recovery who, after getting a few solid years under their belt, stopped showing up. Or at least stopped showing up every week to the meetings they usually went to. Or at least stopped showing up every week to the meetings I usually went to. I told myself a story of how they were betraying those of us with less time, and being selfish, acting like superstars in recovery who didn't need to give anything back.

But enough about them, let's talk about me. That story was actually a lie I told myself to al-

low myself to not be accountable and justify doing what my addict wanted me to do: "If so-and-so doesn't go to meetings, I don't have to do my 9th step because I don't have the inspiration I need from them to do it."

> And a funny thing has happened over the last few years in my recovery. First, as I've continued to work with my sponsor through the steps and deepen my recovery, the need to go to meetings has lessened considerably. The cravings have disappeared, and using dreams only occur once a year instead of once a week or once a month. And additionally, an even stranger thing has occurred. I've begun to participate in life! My days are very full, and as I've continued to build my relationships, finish my college degree, establish myself in my career, and plan trips around the world, I've put the most sacred act a recovering addict can take on the backburner: carrying the message to the newcomer.

The impact on me has been that I feel an aching disconnectedness. I feel disconnected from the program. I feel disconnected from my own recovery. I feel disconnected from my people: you. The impact on you all is that you don't get 7+ years of experience,

strength & hope I share with the message I carry when I speak, either in front of the group, or one-on-one with the person who's just come into one of their

first few meetings.

So here's my commitment. My commitment is to come once per week to an MA meeting, to share my experience, strength and hope. My commitment is to freely sponsor as many people who ask. And ultimately, my commitment is to bring the focus in my own recovery back to the newcomer. To solidify this commitment, and (continued on page 2)

The 7th by Anonymous

When I came into Marijuana Anonymous, some years ago now, I was following everyone else's lead by putting a dollar in the basket — and I was grateful to do it. As time went by I started dropping a second buck in the basket as it went around. As more time passed I began to reflect on just how much money I used to go through when I was getting high. The amounts were staggering! By now, I had a real job, a regular paycheck, and a roof over my head. None of which would have been possible if not for Marijuana Anonymous. I realized I was in a position to be a little bit more generous to the program that saved my life. I figured I could start putting five dollars in the basket as it went around. I go to three meetings a week so that comes out to about sixty dollars a month. I was easily spending ten times that a month on dope. I then went through a period of unemployment and had to reduce my donations to be able to survive. But I'm back to work now and am able to increase my donations again.

Now I realize I am very fortunate to have a job, a paycheck, and a roof over my head. I also realize many of us are not quite so lucky. Some are only able to put spare change into the basket, and some — nothing at all — and that is alright, after all there are no dues or fees for membership. Many of us are unemployed or on fixed incomes. And some of us have huge expenses as a result of the "wreckage of our past." I have heard an addict or two say they needed the money for "other things" (cigarettes maybe?). (Things more important than to throw a couple of bucks in the basket for the program that saved their lives?) Would we have "other things" if it weren't for Marijuana Anonymous? But the point is, however, many of us are able to do so much more for the program that made our recovery possible, for the program which returned our lives to us. I'd be willing to bet a good many of us can put a fiver in every basket that goes around now that our drug budgets are things
