She feared it was going to be a long, slow decline, but she had been camping at a Women's Retreat just a couple of weeks ago and told her friends

When I first met Molly, she was new and scared and angry and resentful and wanted to get sobriety the easier, softer way. She whined a lot and kept going over the same issues again and again and again, and expected different results each time. A real addict. She was very angry at God. She had a number of sponsors before she finally settled down to approaching recovery the Program way, not her way. She'd get right up there to Step Four and then decide what she really needed was another sponsor.

that she would be back next year.

A friend of mine and I passed her back and forth a couple of times. The very next day after the last time she asked me, she had a real breakthrough with her sponsor. She was afraid to tell me she wanted to stay where she was. She didn't want to hurt my feelings. But after that breakthrough, it was a blessing in my life to be able to step back and watch her change and grow and blossom.

She fought the cancer for a long time. Just this winter she thought

she was in remission again, only to find out a couple of months later it was all over her. So she went down two paths at once. She really prepared for living and dying at the same time. I cannot imagine that to be an easy thing to do. She set up a living will, with her minister knowing what her wishes about treatment were; in the meantime, she registered for school. She wrote her will, and started to paint her apart-

ment. She didn't do it all perfect all the time (her sponsor and friends ended up having to break into the apartment to get to the cats

at the end), but she did a pretty damn good job. Sometimes she was in complete denial, and sometimes she was taking care of business.

point average was a big clue that I had something more important to do than homework. When I got caught dealing, my parents decided to raid my room. They found everything but the pot I had on me.

I didn't care. I just smoked outside the day after they caught me. So I was busted. Big deal. I promised to go to MA, but I really didn't intend to stay sober. I didn't want to be in a room full of addicts, because I thought I could stop any time I wanted. I just didn't want to.

Soon after, I was caught shoplifting. My mom and dad came and picked me up. Another slap on the wrist. I stopped getting high for about two months—but when I started again, it was like I never stopped. My home life was awful. I was in a constant battle with my parents, and my little brother was being hurt as a result of my selfishness. I thought I was the only person in the whole world.

I was using every day when everything finally hit the fan. My dad broke my guitars, so I ran away. I was caught one week later in Santa Barbara. I told my parents I had a problem, and I needed help.

I came into MA a week later. Since then, I haven't smoked pot once. I have noticed a vast improvement in my life, and it can only get better. So if you are new in the program, the best advice I know is read the literature, get a sponsor, and take a commitment. But more important, keep coming back, because life is worth living. She didn't feel sorry for herself, she just did what she could every day. Some days she was too tired to do anything but sleep. Some days she was planting bulbs for next spring. Some days she call and we'd go through a guided meditation to help her get to sleep. Some days we'd go out to lunch and "rate" the men walking by. Still, she never used marijuana or alcohol again. The pain pills were prescribed and were very necessary. But she was even careful about that.

Her mother died a few years ago; she had no siblings, so MA and her church were her family. One of our members played taxi and drove her to her chemotherapy appointments. Another made sure the acting-taxi could get off from work. Members fed her cats when she was in the hospital. MA members and church friends brought her food when she went through weak periods. One friend helped her patch the walls she was painting. Members and church friends would take her and pick her up from the hospital. Her sponsor and friends cleaned her apartment a number of times. She was so broke, her program friends raised the money to pay for her cremation. And a brand new member gave a home to her newly orphaned cats.

But this isn't about "poor Molly." This is about Triumphant Molly. It's about Molly who learned how to Be Here Now, to be present, to experience presence. It's about Molly who learned how to hope for the best, but plan for the worst. It's about Molly who discovered her Higher Power would take care of her somehow, and learned to trust in God again. It's about Molly who went through some of the toughest

stuff we can do in life, and never drank or used again.

Thank you for being my friend, Molly. Never again will I see the Seven Sisters—as you called the Pleiades—in the autumn and winter skies without thinking of you.
