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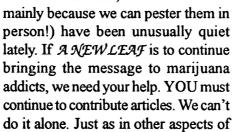
## A New Leaf Needs YOU!!

But fear locked me in a prison of self-destructiveness.

One morning I woke up and knew this way of life could no longer work. I realized that pot was the cause of my pain. So I proceeded to look in the phone book for help. I saw the number for NA, I called, got directions to a meeting, and went. For two months I went, but felt I didn't belong because I was "only" a chronic pot smoker. And, just being there was a heavyduty experience that made me want to go out and get high. But right when I was ready to stop going to meetings, someone handed me an MA directory

and said maybe MA would be better for me.

So, in April 1994 I went to my first MA meeting in Covina. It was the beginning of my new life! I did this for me because I feel I am worthy of being healthy in body, mind, and spirit. Ever since then, I can see my life changing for the better.

I owe a lot to MA for being there! Now I am in college with a 3.8 grade average. And I am going to teach little children... something I have always wanted to do.
